Our focus is on sustainable solutions to reduce the number of strays, promote responsible pet ownership, and facilitate dog adoptions. Our Team

Dr. Lili Castille, an American psychologist, has been instinctively attuned to animals since childhood. She therefore works hard to alleviate the suffering of animals. She rescued scores of abused, neglected or illegally trafficked exotic or endangered animals and birds while living in Asia. Now, she and Lance have co-founded Republic of Georgia Dog Refuge (Geo Dog Refuge) to rescue, rehabilitate, and re-home abandoned animals in this country.

Dr. Lance Castille, an American psychologist and consultant, has had years of experience caring for animals, including farm animals and pets. Having lived overseas for over three decades, he has observed the treatment of animals in different cultures. He supervises rehabilitation and socialization of the rescued dogs for their best possible future as companion dogs.

Alex Sani, a company manager in Batumi, is a founding member and the caretaker of the ROG Dog Refuge compound. He has had a connection with animals since childhood, and has always been able to feel their pain and happiness. He feels animal energy is the best medicine, and says that if people love and care for all animals, that love will always be unconditionally returned. He has both dog and cat family members.

Measures of Success in 2022

The seaside resort and retirement town of Batumi, Georgia (population 150,000) has a disproportionately large population of homeless dogs (30,000).

The Republic of Georgia Dog Refuge (Geo Dog Refuge) started informally as the Batumi Animal Friends Association in 2019 to rescue dogs most at risk, recruit volunteers to help feed the strays and transport sick and injured ones to veterinarians.

In June, 2022 Republic of Georgia Dog Refuge (Geo Dog Refuge) became formally established both as a registered nonprofit organization in Georgia and a 501(c3) in the USA.

It is a no-cage, no-kill refuge with an open-admissions policy that follows socially conscious principles: We rescue dogs of any age, breed and temperament and in any condition: ill, injured, senior or disabled.

There is no a set time limit for how long a dog can remain in our care while waiting for adoption.

For many, particularly senior and disabled dogs, Geo Dog Refuge becomes their forever home, where they can live out their lives in comfort and safety.

Highlights

- We have treated more than 100 dogs in our Catch Vaccinate Sterilize and Release program, and our live release rate remains above 90%.
- We have provided food and emergency medical care every week for approximately 300 homeless dogs in and around Batumi, in nearby towns, and in rural area.
- We have also distributed free dog food and medical care to 50 low-income pet owners in our weekly Community Outreach program.

In 2022, Geo Dog Refuge experienced a record number of animal intakes due to post-pandemic and war inflation financial strain, and the housing crisis. However, through the efforts of a small, but dedicated staff and team of volunteers, we have found homes for many animals.



In comparison to 2021, below is how we made an impact:

- 19 Volunteers served 1290 hours to help us provide quality care for dogs at Geo Dog Refuge, in our annex Dog Camp, and for our Community Outreach program
- 20 Adoptions (50% increase).
- 20 Lost pets returned home (25% increase)
- **30** Animals transferred to trusted rescue partners
- 40 New dogs rescued and accommodated at Geo Dog Refuge
- 45 Animals fostered in 2022
- 108 Spay/Neuters (30% increase) (in our CVSR program)
- **108** Animals vaccinated (30% increase)
- 300 Dogs in Batumi communities, landfill colonies and rural areas regularly fed
- 365 Days of shelter provided for 70 animals



The Challenge: Georgia's Stray Dog Population and Animal Welfare Issues

Georgia's stray dog population has reached an alarming number, with an estimated 500,000 in rural areas, 30,000 in Batumi, and 50,000 in Tbilisi. Despite this growing issue, the Georgian government is no longer able to provide funding for animal welfare programs or support the Catch-Sterilize-Vaccinate-Release (CSVR) initiative. As a result, the number of stray dogs continues to increase, resulting in a significant animal welfare challenge.

conflict The ongoing between neighboring Russia and Ukraine has directly impacted dog abandonment in Georgia, with the influx of refugees and war inflation resulting more abandoned animals. Moreover, washed-up anti-ship mines along the Black Sea coast pose a risk to the street dog population, as they frequent beach areas.

Insufficient animal welfare laws and policies have led to widespread abuse and neglect in Georgia. The country has the highest number of rabies cases in Europe, emphasizing the need for vaccinations as part of our program to ensure the safety of both street dogs and public health. Our organization recognizes the challenges posed by Georgia's stray dog population and animal welfare issues and is committed to finding sustainable solutions to improve the lives of dogs in our community.

We are tackling the alarming increase of Georgia's stray dog population amid insufficient animal welfare laws and policies, and the challenges posed by the ongoing conflict and natural disasters.





2022 in Photos and Stories

The Republic of Georgia Dog Refuge (Geo Dog Refuge) made significant strides in 2022, rescuing and caring for homeless dogs in Batumi, Georgia. Through our Community Outreach program, we provided weekly food and emergency medical care to 300 homeless dogs and supported 50 low-income pet owners. 



Geo Dog Refuge primarily finances its operations and programs through selffunding, with only a small portion of its budget supplemented by generous donations from supporters.

The Community Outreach program provides weekly food and emergency medical care to 300 homeless dogs and support to 50 low-income pet owners.

Throughout 2022, Geo Dog Refuge achieved notable success, with significant increases in adoptions, lost pet reunions, spay/neuters, and vaccinations, thanks to the unwavering commitment of 19 volunteers and collaborations with over 40 rescue organizations.

The organization primarily self-finances its operations, with a small portion of the budget supplemented by donations from supporters.
